Since 1974, Warren Village has provided unhoused and unstably housed low-income, single-parent families with the space and resources to achieve economic mobility. Our 2-generation (2Gen) approach to working with the parents and children on major developmental stages creates a multiplier effect that catapults both generations toward success. Our model has proven that with safe, consistent, and affordable housing, wraparound supportive services, and an on-site early learning center, families can achieve economic and personal independence.

WARREN VILLAGE'S PROGRAM MODEL



EARLY EDUCATION & CHILD CARE

Children who experience trauma and housing instability are at an increased risk of facing social, emotional, and cognitive barriers. Warren Village's on-site Early Learning Center (ELC) provides early childhood education, childcare, mental health supports, and two-thirds of the daily nutritional requirements for children between the ages of 6 weeks to 10 years. The ELC maintains low teacher-to-student ratios in the classroom to foster more one-on-one interaction and individualized instruction.



PARENT SERVICES & ADVOCACY

Warren Village provides each resident with a Family Advocate who helps them set goals and connects them to resources. Their client-centered approach includes post-secondary education support, career exploration, financial literacy classes, holistic wellness supports, and comprehensive long-term housing planning.



SAFE & AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Warren Village offers transitional housing for single-parent families. With a safe place to call home, parents have the peace of mind to work toward achieving economic mobility and disrupting systems of poverty.

WHO WE SERVE

Residents are 18 years or older with at least one child under the age of 5. Less than 50% are employed when they arrive, and 100% were previously unhoused or experiencing housing instability. Many residents and their children have experienced trauma. Residents are committed to full-time work and/or education, attend Life Skills Classes, and participate in our wellness initiative and other programs. Each resident's rent is based on their income.
