Warren Village Resident Kayce Receives Community Advocate Award

Kayce is a resident at Warren Village, a parent of two, a full-time student working toward his Master's in Social Work at Metro State University, and an intern at the Colorado Health Network. Last year, he also became a community advocate for people with medical debt. At the age of 19, Kayce underwent surgery for an undiagnosed congenital condition, which left him deeply in debt, devastating his credit score. During the 2023 Regular Session of the Colorado General Assembly, Kayce passionately and courageously testified three times in support of HB23-1126, a bill that prohibits consumer reporting agencies in Colorado from including medical debt in credit reports.

Kayce was one of three recipients of the Colorado Center on Law and Policy 2023 Community Advocates of the Year award. In November, he and his community celebrated at the Communities Against Poverty event, where Kayce accepted his award, and shared the following words.

"As we speak, thousands of Colorado citizens are unhoused due to predatory medical debt and its affects on credit scores. This devastating cycle can feel like trying to build a house out of feathers. You get sick; you are out of work; you can't afford necessities; and then you get a bill, many like mine, in the 10s of thousands of dollars. In the wake of devastating illness, people are left in anguish over

debt they couldn't possibly afford, so it goes to collections. Your credit score takes a nosedive. Now you can't get a car, or an apartment, or a loan for an illness or injury that was completely outside of your control.

"For lucky people like me, you rely on family while you desperately attempt to climb out of the hole that medical debt has put you in. Luckily for me, I am not unhoused or living with family today. For the first time in my life, I have my own apartment. It's all mine. I live in subsidized housing for single parents at risk of becoming unhoused called Warren Village. They teach me skills to effectively live independently, and I am finally in a place to work on building my credit that was devastated due to medical debt.

"I want to thank the Colorado Center on Law and Policy for their tireless work fighting for Coloradans like me. It is an honor to receive this award. I treasured the opportunity to have an impact on the passing of HB23-1126, and it has inspired me to pursue macro social work. So I'll see you at the Capitol in three years.

"As Martin Luther King Jr. said, 'Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly."

Parents listened to music and relaxed as they enjoyed full bellies and the sound of their children's laughter. TIAA employee and Family Night volunteer, Mercedes Casados, was enthusiastic about the experience. "I have to say this is definitely one of my favorite volunteer events, and despite the rain, it turned out great. I hope we are able to do another one with Warren Village in the future," she said. Why is equity and inclusion such an important part of the workplace?

From a workforce perspective, diversity of people and perspectives in inclusive workplaces fosters more creativity and innovation—leading to effective solutions and ideas. It helps attract and retain talent and foster a positive work culture, which allows folks to be more satisfied with their jobs and life outside of work. Why did you choose to work in nonprofit and/or equity and inclusion?

As a Hmong American woman, I've navigated the "in-between" spaces within various areas of my life and community. What changes do you hope to see within Warren Village because of your work/role?

At Warren Village, we aspire to make equity and inclusion intrinsic to our work, culture, and practices. Our commitment is not just in words; it's also in deliberate action. We are a learning organization, and acknowledge that we are all still learning on this journey. I hope that as we continue DEI work, our staff and community will continue to grow together. The initial step we're taking is to spend time learning more deeply about intercultural difference and how this plays a role in how we resolve conflict, engage in groupwork and meetings, communicate with one another, and fulfill our work together. I hope through coaching, training, sharing resources, and strategizing an effective learning and development plan, everyone at Warren Village will be able to apply a DEI lens in their work with one another, our residents, and the community.

How do you hope to connect with staff members?

My ambitious goal is to meet with everyone before my first quarter is over, getting to know their backgrounds, hopes, and goals for our work together. I think breaking bread is so important for forming authentic connection, so I hope to be able to share more meals and drinks with folks here at the organization to connect with staff members, and play alongside them!

Tell us a little about yourself and your family.

I am originally from Boulder and have lived in Denver for 13 years. Supporting community organizations has always been a core value of mine, and I strive to instill that value in my children, as well. I have two daughters, Lila (13) and Gracie (11), and a son, Bracken (8). I am an active member in the community and have served on a variety of cultural boards in Denver.

How did you first become involved with Warren Village?

I became involved at the encouragement of my neighbor and friend, Joel Rosenstein, who serves on the Board of Trustees. After attending an information night, I was inspired by the reach of Warren Village and the significant impact that the organization has on the lives of single-parent families. I have a passion for helping kids, and wanted to lead a project that would support kids in the Early Learning Center.

What inspired you to support the shoe drive? What was this experience like for you and your family?

I was excited to have an opportunity to help that would achieve several things: 1) Give me an opportunity to tell my community and network about an organization that I feel is worth supporting 2) Give my kids an opportunity to directly help with the collection of shoes, and then distribute them alongside me to kids at Warren Village 3) Demonstrate to my kids and others the impact of something simple such as a new pair of shoes on the confidence and optimism of the kids they are going to.

How did your community support you in making this year's shoe drive a success?

I have wonderfully supportive friends and family who are eager to give back and are often looking for ways to do so. Nearly one hundred people stepped up and bought shoes for kids, or they supported the effort by purchasing Walmart gift cards for older kids to pick out their own shoes.

Why do you think it's important for the community to give back?

Giving back gives me as much as I feel it gives others. It always feels better to give than receive, particularly when you can see your effort impacting lives in a positive way. This was a great experience for my kids and served as a reminder that anyone can make an impact - even kids! It is important

Aspire Gala 2023: Building Community










On October 6, 2023, the Warren Village community came together at the Denver Art Museum for the Aspire Gala, presented by United Airlines, to celebrate, dance, and hear about the impact of safe and supportive housing. This year's theme, "Building Community," exemplified the collaborative support and partnership that makes our work possible. Together, we recognized the hard work of our residents and alumni who are creating the blueprints for their future.

As a community, we tapped into our collective power to affect change and invest in the families that we serve. With your tremendous support, we raised over \$440,000, including setting a new record of over \$230,000 from the paddle raise that evening. Keynote speaker and alumna, Jada Galassini, shared her story of building a new life at Warren Village, and where she and her daughter, Gabby, are today. Jada had the community and resources to focus on herself and begin the process of healing from co-dependent and unhealthy relationships. "During my time at Warren Village, I took advantage of the services offered. The Holiday Shop provided by donors gave us a full Christmas tree every year. We never went without heat, water, or air conditioning. I had food if needed. The advice I received was invaluable. The subsidized rent and scholarship opportunities I received led to a nice savings account when I was ready to move out. My wonderful Family Advocate at Warren Village referred me to the therapist Pam, who helped me set boundaries between my family, my ex, and my old life to aid my mental health improvements."
